MUSIC NOTES

Today at Communion, St. Gregory's Choir will sing the motet *Ecce vicit Leo* by Peter Philips (1561-1628). Philips was a boy soprano at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. At around the age of 20, he left England for continental Europe as a result of his Roman Catholic faith. Later in life he would be accused of participating in a plot to assassinate Elizabeth I, though nothing seems to have been proven.

Philips scored his motet *Ecce vicit Leo* for double choir, echoing the styles of composers a few generations before him. The rhythmic excitement is infectious from beginning to end!

The organ piece after High Mass is *Te Deum* by Jean Langlais (1907-1911). Langlais' inspiration for this piece was the ancient plainsong hymn *Te Deum*. This hymn is dramatically quoted at the beginning of the piece in octaves.

He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. We acclaim you holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy.
