MUSIC NOTES

Today at the Offertory, St. Dunstan's Choir will sing the anthem Let God arise by Englishman Matthew Locke (c.1622-1677). Locke's anthem is full of compelling text painting, from the 16th note figures on "fly before him" to the dance-like passages "let them also be merry and joyful."

During Communion, St. Gregory's Choir will sing the motet Lobet den Herrn by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750). This motet is one of the major works for the choir concert today. A difficult piece, it is perhaps rather rare to hear it in the liturgy! The text of the motet is the German translation of Psalm 117. The opening section of the motet is joyful and extroverted; the expansive vocal lines seem to suggest praise for God swelling from his people and covering the whole world. The second section has a hymn-like texture, singing of God's grace (Gnade) and truth (Wahrheit). Bach sets the word "Ewigkeit" to very long notes, musically depicting God's care for us throughout "eternity." The final section is a joyful Alleluja.







Second Reading—I Corinthians 3: 10-11, 16-23

According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and someone else is building on it. Each builder must choose with care how to build on it. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ. Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you? If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy that person. For God's temple is holy, and you are that temple. Do not deceive yourselves. If you think that you are wise in this age, you should become fools so that you may become wise. For the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God. For it is written, "He catches the wise in their craftiness," and again, "The Lord knows the thoughts of the wise, that they are futile." So let no one boast about human leaders. For all things are yours, whether Paul or Apollos or Cephas or the world or life or death or the present or the future-- all belong to you, and you belong to Christ, and Christ belongs to God.
