MUSIC NOTES

The organ piece before High Mass today is Pièce Héroïque by César Franck (1822-1890). Franck was one of the 19th century's most influential organist-composers. His most famous composition is his orchestral symphony in D minor.

Franck composed for the great organ at the Basilica of St. Clotilde in Paris. This organ was built by Aristide Cavaillé-Coll (1811-1899). Cavaillé-Coll designed organs in a symphonic manner, similar to a symphony orchestra. He expanded the types of sounds and expressive capabilities of the organ.

Inspired by the organ at St. Clotilde, Pièce Héroïque is a dramatic piece in three main sections. The first section announces the main themes. The middle section is tranquil and melodious, but the stillness is occasionally interrupted by the pedals imitating battle sounds. The final section of the piece features a dramatic crescendo, culminating in triumphant chords in B Major.

At High Mass, St. Dunstan's Choir will sing the Kyrie and Agnus Dei Stelliferi conditor orbis. This plainsong mass comes from the Graduale Romanum. The Graduale Romanum was compiled by the monks of Solesmes Abbey in France, a result of the growing interest in chant from the 19th century.

We acclaim you holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to your help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new. And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Remember all who have died in the peace of Christ, and those whose faith is known to you alone; bring them into the place of eternal joy and light. And grant that we may find our inheritance with the Blessed Virgin Mary, with patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, and all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through your Son Jesus Christ Our Lord.

BRITTEN 100 AT GRACE CHURCH

The concert series continues on Sunday, November 10 at 4:00 P.M. with a performance celebrating 100th anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Britten (1913-1976). Britten was one of the 20th century's greatest composers. In addition to his sacred music, he wrote for nearly every type of instrument, and he composed many famous operas.

On November 10, our choirs will sing music of Britten with guest conductor Timothy Brown. And tenor Andy McCullough will perform some of Britten's songs, accompanied by Joseph Arndt.

Timothy Brown was for 30 years Director of Music at Clare College in Cambridge, England, where he succeeded famous composer John Rutter. Mr. Brown made numerous recordings with the Clare Choir, particularly on the Naxos label. Many parishioners may remember that he and the Clare Choir sang for Advent Lessons & Carols in December 2009. Mr. Brown is arguably one of the world's greatest living choral conductors. Our parish community is very lucky to be hosting him.
