MUSIC NOTES

Maundy Thursday is the first day in the Paschal Triduum, or the three days leading up to Easter. As with the rest of the Triduum, it has its own special musical traditions, most notably in the silencing of the organ and bells following the Gloria in excelsis. All music after the Gloria is sung *a capella* (unaccompanied), including the hymns.

The *Adagio* from Vierne's third organ symphony is one of his more well-known symphony movements. The movement is in B Minor (the subdominant key, or key built on the fourth scale degree, of f-sharp minor, which is the key the symphony begins and ends in), and is the second-to-last movement in the five movement symphony. However, Vierne leaves us with lots of doubt as to the tonality. His dark, chromatic language is in full force here, leaving us with a heart-wrenching, tragic piece of music, perfect for preparing us for the Paschal Triduum. This mood reflects Vierne's own life at the time. Published in 1911, the Third Symphony was written after a period of professional and personal disappointment, after a betrayal and bitter divorce, being passed over for a much-wanted teaching post at the Paris Conservatoire after assurance that the post was his, and the almost simultaneous deaths two people close to Vierne: his mother, and his friend and mentor Alexandre Guilmant. Vierne's life was not a happy one in general. Born mostly blind, he was plagued by poor health, and was not allowed to remarry after his marriage was annulled. However, he enjoyed a good professional reputation and a prominent post, as Organiste Titulaire at Notre Dame de Paris, with one of Aristide Cavaillé-Coll's largest instruments.

Franco-Flemish composer Josquin des Prez is now considered the first master of the style of polyphony which defined the High Renaissance era, and was doubtless a major influence on composers like Victoria and Palestrina. He was especially well-known for his Mass settings, of which the *Missa Pange Lingua* is among the most famous. A Paraphrase Mass which is based on an embellished version of a monophonic tune, this Mass is based on the hymn *Pange Lingua* which will be sung at the Procession to the Altar of Repose near the end of the Maundy Thursday Mass. The hymn is easily heard in the Kyrie heard at the beginning of Mass.

Byrd's Ave Verum Corpus is one of the more well-known settings of this standard Eucharistic Hymn. Written in the midst of the English Reformation, it was an unusual time for hymns for Eucharistic Adoration to come out of England. Byrd, however, was a devout Catholic until the end of his life, and continued to write music for Catholic services even as the Church of England became more and more reformed. What Byrd came up with is among the finest examples of 4-voice Tudor Polyphony.



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading—Exodus 12: 1-14a

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you.

Rite of Foot-washing

The people remain seated for the Rite of Foot-washing. The Celebrant addresses the congregation about the significance of the rite. Then twelve persons who are to represent the congregation come forward, and the Celebrant washes their feet while the Choir sings.

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. *Amen*.

The Celebrant says

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. Amen.






